## **BWI Vehicle Critical Survival Reminders**

[For: Cars, Trucks, Offroad Vehicles, Snowmobiles, ATV's, Quads, etc.]

## Vehicle Survival Equipment Considerations

- Always carry the **15 Critical Items**.
- Remember it's your vehicle carrying the gear, so error on the side of taking extra gear along ALWAYS.
- An excellent 1st Aid Kit, Survival Candles (2 or 3), a good shovel, jumper cables, gas line antifreeze (2 or 3 bottles), a roll of duct tape, and properly fitted tire chains should be carried in addition to all standard survival equipment.
- How many persons travel in your vehicle on average? Remember to add the additional clothing sleeping bags, mattresses, and equipment needed by your passengers.
- □ Reflective marker panels, flares, and vehicle repair equipment should be carried.
- □ Extra fuel and water are also good additional items on long trips to remote locations.
- □ If you have room carry extra fire lighting gear including kindling and wood shavings.

## Vehicle Survival Suggestions

- Take a defensive driving course.
- Learn to repair your vehicle.
- □ Preventive maintenance for your vehicle is very important, keep your vehicle maintained, including checking your spare tire, battery, jack, survival gear, and tool kit.
- If conditions are poor don't go, take a break, or travel at or below the safe speed for the condition of the road and your vehicle handling and stopping ability.
- □ Tell someone where you are going, know the true range of your vehicle, and do proper route planning.
- Take along a Cell Phone, a Map, and listen to a complete weather forecast.
- □ Take along a phone book with local rescue and recovery numbers. It also makes an excellent addition to your fire in a pinch.
- □ When stuck do not leave your vehicle unless you have a spot to light a fire or shelter nearby:
  - 1. Don't just abandon your vehicle.
  - 2. Turn it off to save fuel, if you have nay and or it still works.
  - 3. If you can reach help on your cell phone call.
  - 4. Use your marker panel or similar device hung from an antenna or roof rack to attract attention.
  - 5. Roll down a window a few inches on the least windy side of the vehicle.
  - 6. Get into the extra clothing you have and then your sleeping bag.
  - 7. Light 1 of your survival candles.
  - 8. Exit the vehicle on a regular basis to blow your whistle and listen for a response and look around.
  - 9. Clean your vehicle off on a regular basis to ensure it does not look abandon.
  - 10. Don't give up hope, someone will come along.
